

MR. JUDGE TELLS ABOUT THEOSOPHY.

Mr. William Q. Judge lectured yesterday afternoon before the Academy of Anthropology on "The Influence of the Theosophical Society and of its Work in India." In introducing his subject Mr. Judge said that theosophy meant wisdom or knowledge about God, but that the Theosophical Society was composed of all classes and races of people, of all degrees of culture, and consequently its knowledge was limited. It was formed in New-York in 1875 by Henry S. Olcott, Mme. Blavatsky, the lecturer, and others. Its purpose was to form the nucleus of a universal brotherhood of humanity, without distinction of race, creed, or color, to study Aryan and other Eastern religions, philosophy, and literature, and to investigate unexplained laws of nature and the physical powers latent in man. Its motto is: "There is no religion higher than truth."

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
