

POM SOH'S BODY CREMATED.

Under the Auspices of the Theosophical Society in Washington.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—The body of Pom Kwang Soh, the former Corean Minister to this country, whose death occurred here last Friday, was to-day cremated, according to the expressed wish of the deceased, and his ashes placed in the keeping of the present Minister, Mr. Chin Pom Yo. Later they may be sent to Corea. At 3:30 o'clock this afternoon the body was taken from the Fourteenth Street residence, where it had laid in state, and conveyed to Lee's crematory, on Pennsylvania Avenue, followed by a long line of carriages containing personal friends of the dead Minister and prominent members of the Blavatsky branch of the Theosophical society, of which Mr. Soh was a member. The brief and simple funeral services were conducted by Mr. George M. Coffin, President of the society.

The casket was draped with a silk American flag, and on it also had been placed the robes of state worn by Mr. Soh during his official career here. At both ends of the coffin were crosses of white and pink roses, which had been sent by Prince Min and Mr. Pak. Among those admitted to the chapel were Prince Min, Prince Enyi Wha, the second son of the present King of Corea, in full Court uniforms; Mr. Pak, Mr. Surh, a number of Corean students, and a number of the members of the Theosophical society.
